Collections Corner: Mary Shellman Civil War to Suffrage Exhibit

The Society's amazing collections management team, led by Stephanie Eckard, is counting down the days to the installation of HSCC's new *Mary Shellman: Civil War to Suffrage Exhibit.* Stephanie and interns Sage Zavandro (WMHS '25), and Hayden Lloyd (WHS '25) have been working alongside Sarah Coster every week getting ready for the big reveal in May of this year. The new exhibit on the second floor of the Sherman-Fisher-Shellman House will feature never-before-seen artifacts from the collection, including items owned by Mary Shellman herself! The idea of creating a permanent exhibition dedicated to the life and public service of Mary Shellman has been around for a long

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time, but now, thanks to a grant from the Heart of the Civil War Heritage Area, and an amazing group of volunteers, the Society is finally making this dream a reality.



Auspiciously, just as Sarah Coster started working with the Society on this project, HSCC received an incredible collection of artifacts and archival documents related to Mary Shellman and her nephew Paul Reese, shipped to us from Paul Reese's descendant Coral Graham in Rockport, Texas. The collection consists of letters, poems, a ribbon from the General Army of the Republic given to Mary Shellman, and a card signed in 1941 by Paul Reese verifying that the first ever domestic telephone in Carroll County was installed on the second floor in the Sherman-Fisher-Shellman House. As a part of the May exhibit, we will also feature a special artifact on loan from the Carroll County Farm Museum in Mary Shellman's telephone room! Society members will receive a special exhibit preview invitation soon!

May 24th 2pm-4pm, come experience an afternoon with one of Westminster's great female activists, suffragettes, community volunteers, and leaders. You will be immersed in Mary Shellman's life through her songs, poems, and letters. Historian, author, playwright, actress, and storyteller Darci Tucker brings Mary to life with her portrayal live on stage against the backdrop original music and poetry of Mary Shellman produced and arranged by Jacquelyn Slade of the Peabody Institute. It is hard to believe 2025 is here, with warmer weather just around the corner! What an incredible last six months for HSCC! Phase 1 of our new walkway was installed at Kimmey, we completed the first room of what will become the new

Library at Cockey's, we finalized plans for the new Shellman Civil War to Suffrage exhibit (thank you, Heart of the Civil War Heritage Area!), and we coordinated numerous events and programs! Thank you, Laura and our amazing volunteers and committees!

All this is accomplished because of your membership, donations, time, and love for history. HSCC's Board and Staff continue to be guided by the conviction that history is relevant and important. Local history shows how our community evolved and who built it. History provides us with invaluable lessons on what we did right and how we could have done better. Most importantly, stories of struggle and triumph from the past can inspire individuals to make their own community stronger and more connected.

The Society has secured some new grant support and special funding for various projects and initiatives since the last edition of the *Courier*, and I wanted to give readers a quick run-down of what we are working on.

- The Maryland State Arts Council has awarded HSCC a grant to not only support *An Afternoon with Mary Shellman* event at the Carroll Arts Center in May. Thank you also to Hey Westminster! and The League of Women Voters of Carroll County. In partnership with the Peabody Institute we will record some of Mary Shellman's original musical scores ! We will be able to listen to Mary Shellman's original suffragist music!
- Private funding is allowing us to launch HSCC's digital library very soon. At first, we thought our new CatalogIt collections system might work in this capacity, but the new digital library will be much more search-capable. To start, the *Union Bridge Pilot, Carroll News, Caroll History Journal,* and *Carroll Yesteryears* will be accessible on the digital library, slated to launch before summer.
- A grant from the Maryland 250 Commission will allow us to create a pop-up travelling exhibit for the 250 Semiquincentennial Anniversary! We will soon start this project in partnership with the Carroll 250 Initiative and the Society's Outreach Committee.

There is more in the works, but I don't have enough room on this page to share it all! Like in years' past, the plan is for Jim Shriver and me to have an open Zoom session to hear feedback from members and discuss the numerous projects and plans underway. Keep an eye out for this special on-line meeting in June/July. Of course, always email or call me if you have any ideas or questions about the Society.



Tales from the Gardens

Welcome to the HSCC Gardens by Bill Palm

With the arrival of Spring, the HSCC gardens awaken. As plants appear, volunteer gardeners also arrive to cultivate them. This seems an appropriate time to review the scenes that you can expect to encounter as you enter the area.

First, a brief historical note: about 70 years ago (1955) the Carroll Garden Club began developing and caring for the garden area behind the Shellman House. This garden area became known as the Lillian Shipley Memorial Garden, in recognition of Miss Lillian Shipley who served as the Society's first resident curator from 1953-1962.

The Carroll Garden Club has resumed care for the extensive flower garden area to the rear of the Sherman/Fisher/ Shellman House, providing blossoms that evolve during the seasons. There is a bench where you may wish to rest or to contemplate. Children may find the open lawn a convenient play area, or it may be used for special events.

The Carroll County Master Gardeners provide a volunteer outreach and education arm of the County Extension Office. They are implementing projects that evoke Westminster of two centuries ago, during the early days of the city.



Jacob Sherman, who built his home in 1807, was a highly successful businessman and farmer whose extensive land holdings included a 10-acre plot behind the house extending through the area now occupied by the American Legion. We know from Sherman's records that he maintained a substantial vegetable garden, probably located in the field near his barn. Because Sherman was raised in a Penn-sylvania German family, we are willing to presume that his garden would follow their traditional four -square pattern. So, in our limited space, we have established a very small-scale garden to exhibit practices of the period, including the heirloom produce with seeds to be saved from year-to-year (and generation to generation).

It was common practice for a household of the period to have an herb garden, more for medicinal and aromatic purposes than for culinary use. The Master Gardeners researched herb garden patterns and developed a garden that follows German traditions as symmetrical, utilitarian, and attractive.

Jacob had a loom house where his enslaved servant wove linen fabrics. We created a small garden of plants that would have been available to produce dyes. It seems unlikely that the weaver produced her own dyes, which were commercially readily available when desired, but it seems appropriate to demonstrate the botanical sources for dyes.

The garden behind the Kimmey House features native plants. In fact, formal landscaping was uncommon in the small rural towns of two centuries ago. But there were attractive plants that occurred naturally. Cultivating such plants encourages maintenance of local conditions, such as maintaining a food source for local pollinators.

Please feel free to wander through our gardens. And if you encounter a volunteer gardener, please feel free to ask questions or discuss garden topics of mutual interest.
